

Non-Abstract Driven Sessions

The **non-abstract driven sessions** are developed by the Scientific Programme Committee and Conference Coordinating Committee. Topics and speakers address a variety of current issues and viewpoints using different formats.

Session Types:

- **Plenary sessions** feature some of the world's most distinguished AIDS researchers, scientific leaders and clinical specialists. Plenary sessions bring all conference delegates together at the first session of every morning.
- **Special sessions** feature presentations by some of the world's key research leaders, high-level international AIDS Ambassadors and policy specialists. These 60-minute sessions are highly engaging for all delegates.
- **Bridging sessions** link the four tracks, providing an opportunity for multi-disciplinary, multi-perspective dialogues on cutting-edge topics of common interest. Through interactive formats, speakers share knowledge and perspectives on selected issues. Speakers highlight linkages and synergies between different areas of expertise.
- **Symposia sessions** address critical issues that defy simple solutions. Focusing on a single, clearly defined topic or issue, speakers and delegates will share experiences, contribute relevant research findings and brainstorm ideas to identify possible ways forward. Sessions will also report on new findings and announce forthcoming research and new initiatives.
- New to the IAS conference the **meet the expert** sessions will bring experts together to meet with small groups of participants to discuss, face-to-face, the challenges and opportunities presented by the HIV response. Seating is on a first come, first served basis.
- The **professional development workshops** are designed by the Scientific Programme Committee (SPC) and selected facilitators. Workshops cover all tracks and include several cross-cutting issues and themes. The workshop programme is aimed at increasing the capacity of delegates to implement and advocate for effective, evidence-based HIV policies and interventions in their respective communities and countries. Workshops may be 90 or 180-minutes in duration and are held concurrently with abstract and non-abstract driven sessions. Participation in each workshop is limited and seats are allocated on a first come, first served basis. Workshops are classified into three levels – foundation, intermediate, and advanced – according to levels of experience and expertise of the target audience.
- A **rapporteur summary session** is held immediately before the closing session on Wednesday 3 July from 18:00. The summary session synthesizes presentations made during the week, focusing on critical issues addressed, important results presented and key recommendations put forward. The rapporteur teams will publish daily reports and session summaries on the conference website.

Abstract-Driven Sessions

The abstract driven component of the conference programme offers the highest calibre of state-of-the-art knowledge and peer-reviewed research. Abstract driven sessions are either specific to one of the four tracks (A-D), or are composed of abstracts from different tracks that focus on one theme.

Over 2,100 abstract submissions went through a blind peer-review process, carried out by a panel of around 1,000 international reviewers. Around 850 abstracts were selected by members of the Scientific Programme Committee for inclusion in the conference programme. The highest-scoring accepted abstracts were selected for presentation in oral abstract sessions or oral poster discussion sessions. The majority of the selected posters are displayed in the Poster Exhibition.

In addition, a small number of abstracts submitted as late breakers were accepted to be presented orally or as posters at the conference.

Session Types:

- **Oral Abstract Sessions**

These sessions are organized into themes which address new developments in each of the four scientific tracks, or focus on a topic which crosses various tracks. Oral abstract sessions are 90-minute sessions that consist of five oral presentations of ten minutes followed by a five-minute question and answer session. An interactive moderated discussion, facilitated by the co-chairs, is held at the end of the session.

- **Late Breaker Sessions**

Late breaker sessions are 60-minute sessions that consist of five oral presentations on data that is of unquestioned immediate significance, providing an opportunity for examination of important "late breaking" research. As competition for the limited number of slots available was quite strong, only abstracts presenting truly late breaker research were considered for these sessions.

- **Oral Poster Discussion Sessions**

These sessions, held daily from 13:00 – 14:00, are 60-minute sessions featuring four to six oral presentations of five minutes each. An interactive moderated discussion, facilitated by the co-chairs, is held at the end of the session. Abstracts discussed at these sessions are on display for the duration of the conference next to the mini rooms.

- **Poster Exhibition**

Organized by track and covering a wide variety of topics, the Poster Exhibition includes around 750 posters. The Poster Exhibition is open from Monday 1 – Wednesday 3 July, 10:00 – 18:30, and is located on the Ground Level. See the Poster Exhibition map.

Posters are displayed for the duration of the conference (Monday – Wednesday). Authors will stand by their posters from 12:30 – 14:30 on their assigned presentation day to answer questions and provide further information on their study results.

Late breaker posters are also displayed for the duration of the conference in the Poster Exhibition.

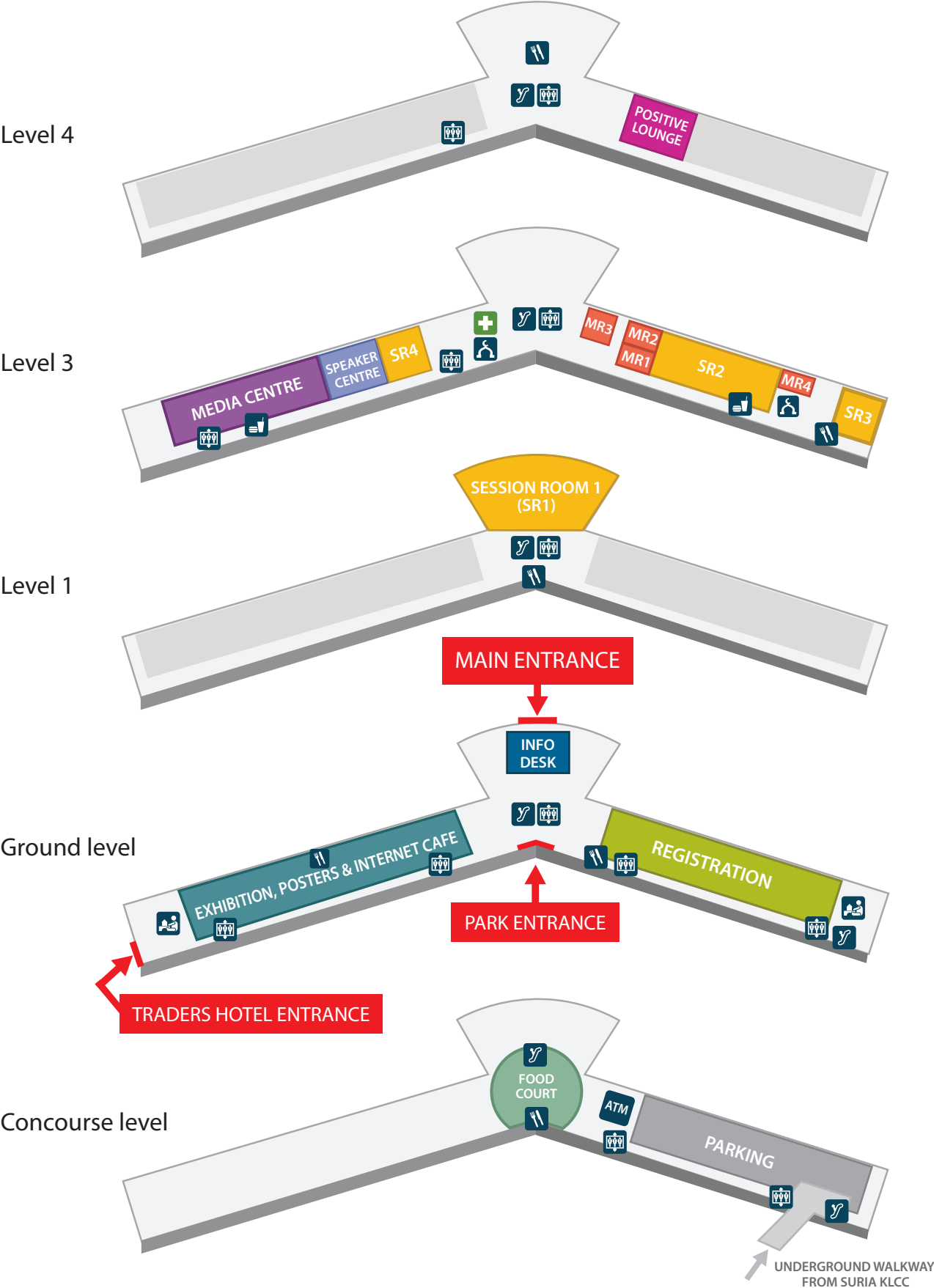

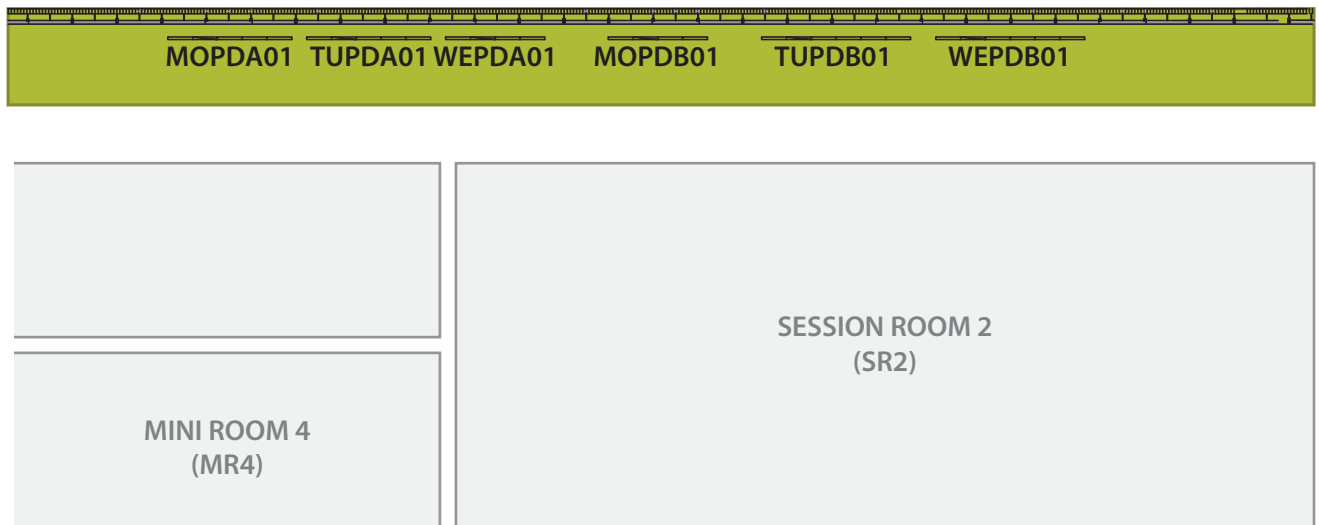

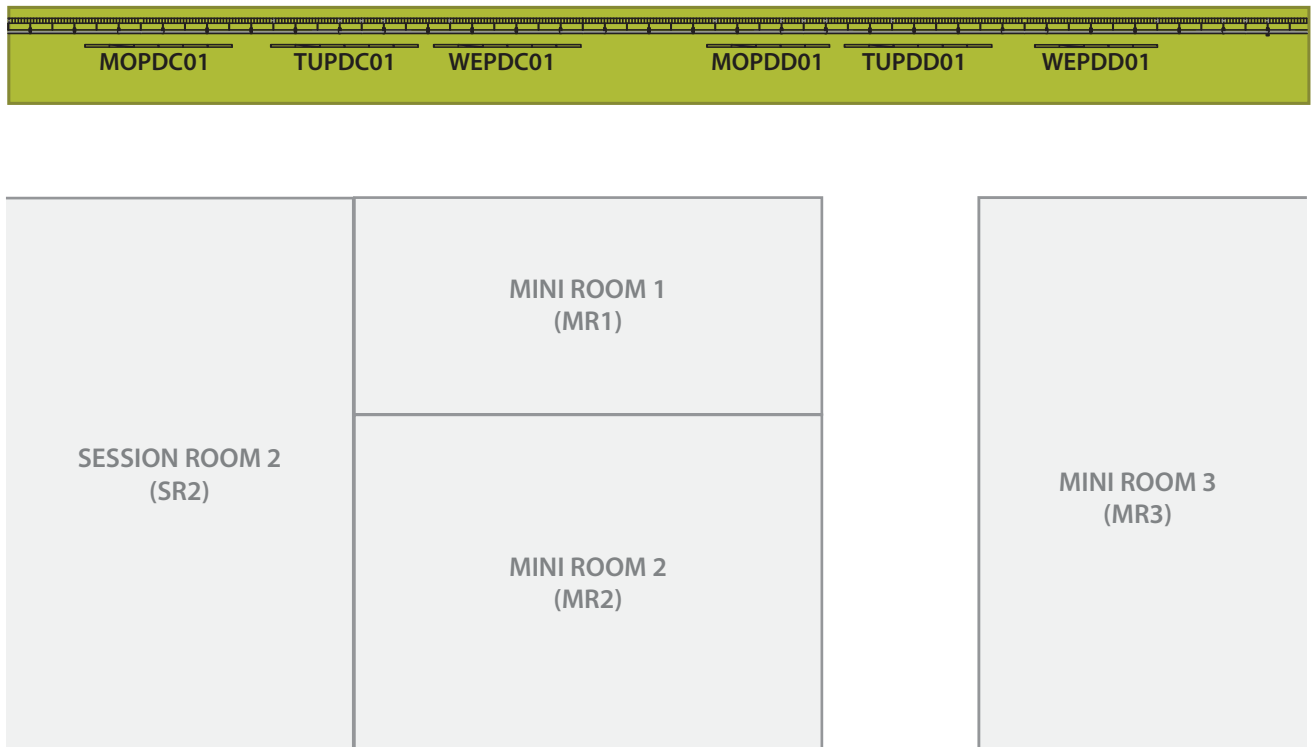
